Dear Friends,

We gather for Spring Sessions at Friends Academy on Long Island. Those of you coming from upstate (which in this case includes even those of us in many parts of New York City) will pass not far from the stone marking the spot where George Fox preached

in 1672, under two large oaks in John Bowne's garden. Much has changed since then: though my meeting, Scarsdale, has a small table made from their wood, the trees are long gone, the stone stands in front of an apartment building, and many of the signs in the busy neighborhood are in Chinese. But some things have not changed. We still, as then, speak truth to power. This Spring Sessions give us a chance to ground our speech in worship together. Witness Coordinating Committee will have space on the agenda; politically things are moving quickly, and there may be important actions to consider, individually or collectively. Christopher Sammond, our General Secretary, will have a report, and we will hear a report on the progress toward replacing him when he resigns this summer.

We had the biggest crowd ever (about 70 people) at Coordinating Committee Weekend in January. It is an important time to be together, Friends. We have a long history of speaking into the political space in which we find ourselves. We know how to do it. Let us support each other in this deep discipline and celebrate our collective wisdom.

Conscientious objection to paying taxes for war –

How can it be legalized?

A program for those committed to Peace ... Note your calendar now!

People of conscience and faith have faced the conflict of what to do about their personal payment of taxes and their deeply held beliefs in opposition to war and military spending. Some people have decided to withhold a portion of their taxes in protest which puts them in violation of the law while others choose to live below the taxable income letting their lives speak out for peace and against war. Many do neither fearing what the government could do to them or because they have obligations to family. The US government has recognized conscientious objection to war since early in the last century after several religious denominations including Quakers in the US lobbied to create a legalized C.O. status. However, conscientious objection does not cover payment of taxes which go to war and other military spending. Expanding the concept of conscientious objection to tax payment is the work of the National Campaign for a Peace Tax Fund/Peace Tax Foundation. NCPTF/PTF has been engaged in the long-term work of lobbying congress to pass the Religious Freedom Peace Tax Fund bill which will entitle taxpayers with moral and ethical concerns about war and military spending to have the portion of their taxes used for war be placed into a fund which can only be used for non-military purposes.

Malachy Kilbride, a member of Friends Meeting of Washington (Washington, DC), is the executive director of NCPTF/PTF. He is a longtime peace and social justice activist. Malachy will be meeting with Friends on **Saturday, March 4, 2017 from 2pm-4pm at Fifteenth Street Meeting**, 15 Rutherford Place, New York 10003. He looks forward to meeting Friends living in the NYC area and sharing the story of NCPTF/PTF and the new Peace Tax Advocate program where people can help pass the bill in congress. Rep. John Lewis (D) of Georgia is the sponsor of the bill which he will reintroduce this spring. Join Malachy as he spreads his message, "If you don't want war, don't pay for it!"

FUM-sponsored Work-Study Trip to Palestine and Israel

Interested in learning more about the Palestinian-Israeli conflict and learning more about the Ramallah Friends School in Palestine? An annual work-study trip to Palestine and Israel is slated for June 20–July 5. Nearly each day includes visits and discussion with representatives of groups focused on some aspect of peace-making. There are trips to see historical Bible-related sites. And there is a work component which, in addition to another project, includes giving the Ramallah Friends Meeting house a thorough cleaning. Worshipping with Friends each Sunday is important support for that small community. For more information contact Max Carter, a retired member of the Guilford College faculty, at mcarter@guilford.edu

My daughter and I were participants on the trip last year. For me it was a return to the Ramallah Friends School where I was a teacher more than 45 years ago and where I met Max Carter, a fellow teacher, who has been running these trips for years. I was amazed at the changes in Palestine since I worked there, but more importantly I found the discussions with various groups of people very enriching and enlightening. One of my best memories was an opportunity to worship with other women at the local mosque one Friday. I also enjoyed seeing more of the countryside than I saw when I was working there.

The Friends Committee on National Legislation has MANY opportunities for young people of all ages to gain hands-on experience lobbying for peace and social justice.

Please share this information widely with young adults.

- **Spring Lobby Weekend (March 18-21, 2017)** will draw some 350 young adults to Washington to be trained and then lobby on income inequality. For those who need it, financial assistance is available.

- **Young Fellows Program (paid, full-time, late August 2017-July 2018)** brings recent college grads to work full-time in our Washington, DC office learning how to change the world. Nearly 200 young adults have come through this program over the last 40 years, and they've gained a keen appreciation for the power of effective, principled advocacy whether they go on to a career in law and policy change or in another field. *Apply by February 15.*
- **Summer Internship Program (June and July 2017)** is designed for college sophomores and juniors. This opportunity provides two months of experience working with our Quaker lobby in Washington, DC. *Apply by March 6.*
- **Advocacy Corps (paid, part-time, August 2017-May 2018)** includes a 10-day training in Washington, DC followed by nine months of part-time, paid consulting work (25-35 hours per month) organizing locally on climate change. *Apply by April 10.*

NYYM Fall Sessions are scheduled to meet at Caldwell University in New Jersey, November 11 and 12, 2017. We will need volunteers to:

- A) Organize and/or provide transportation from the bus stop (and possibly, airport) to the campus
- B) Provide overnight hospitality to Friends coming from a distance
- C) Work at the registration table (we'll need to do this in shifts, all day Saturday)
- D) Help with babies, children, or teens. We have a youth program in the planning stages with Sylke Jackson and Jim Mandala. (we do not plan to have teen sleepovers)
- E) Serve as microphone runners during business meeting (a good way to find out what it's all about)

Annual Conference of Quakers in Pastoral Care and Counseling

***Centered in Wholeness: Body & Spirit* — March 23-26, 2017**

We are delighted to announce that, after postponement for speaker emergency last fall, the annual Quakers in Pastoral Care & Counseling (QPCC) conference has been rescheduled for March 23-26, 2017 at Quaker Hill Conference Center in Richmond, Indiana.

QPCC is an organization of Friends and others called into ministry in pastoral care, counseling, and chaplaincy. We share a commitment to Quaker practice and grounding our work in our faith. We include:

- Professionals in direct care, clinical training, supervision, and administration
- Students/Fellows/Residents in professional programs
- Friends called into other manners and ministries of healing
- Those involved in pastoral care of monthly, quarterly and/or yearly meetings
- Friends who have retired from work in healing/caring fields.

The conference program, "*Centered in Wholeness: Body & Spirit*," will be led by **Stephanie Ford**, known to many as a longtime Associate Professor of Spirituality at Earlham School of Religion. Stephanie is now Minister of Christian Formation at Binkley Baptist Church in Chapel Hill, NC. She also teaches with the Friends of Christ School (a local ecumenical group), and the Upper Room Academy for Spiritual Formation.

The retreat schedule will include discussion and exercises led by Stephanie, small group sharing, and ample time for recharging/reconnecting with F/friends, nature, Spirit, and yourself. Massage, yoga, aromatherapy, centering prayer, and other self-care opportunities are on the menu as well.

Youth Theological Initiative Summer Programs

(Note: this is not a specifically Quaker organization, but it comes recommended from Callid Keefe-Perry, former member of NYYM; the program is Christ-centered and is a rare ecumenical opportunity designed specifically for teens. – Emily Provance)

We are now accepting applications for the 2017 YTI Summer Programs.

YTI started in 1993 with a vision of “cultivating public theologians.” We seek to gather young people from around the country, and even around the world, across diverse racial, ethnic, denominational, theological and cultural perspectives, in order to study Christian theology and connect what we are learning with the needs of our communities. When we come together as a community, we seek to live into what it means to be the Body of Christ for the world.

From **July 2-22, 2017** forty rising high school juniors and seniors will come to the Emory University campus. They will take classes on theological themes taught by Emory University doctoral students and professors. They will engage in service and social justice ministry in the Atlanta community. They will plan and lead creative and inspiring worship and prayer. They will participate in discussions with theology students and “explore questions that shape us.” And, they will make some of the best friends they will ever have. Please consider applying to the YTI Summer Academy for 2017 if you are currently in the 10th or 11th grade, or encourage others who are to do so. Applications are due **March 1st, 2017**, but we are happy to accept them earlier!

New this year, we are introducing a 5-day version of our 3-week program, called “Taste of YTI,” which is open to students currently in 9th-11th grades. We know that for some, a three-week commitment is not possible, so this shorter version might be another option for you. Taste of YTI will be held **June 11-15, 2017**.

There’s an online application, which allows you to apply to BOTH YTI Summer Academy AND Taste of YTI at the same time, in case you are interested in both: https://yti.formstack.com/forms/summer_scholar_programs The online application also automatically sends online recommendation letter forms to the 2 people you choose as recommenders, making the process easier.
