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Bring Your Child to the Fall Sessions Youth Program!

Want to find a way to address the hate crimes in Charlottesville, Virginia? To deal with the divisive policies of the current administration? To talk to people who have ideas and beliefs that are completely different from yours? Come join the youth program at Fall sessions!

This year we will open up the conversation on Friday with an intergenerational Alternatives to Violence mini session with the gathered folks of New York Yearly meeting. We will continue as youth group (sleeping over Friday and Saturday nights) and have time to bond and have fun as we sort out, through active listening, where we are, where we want to go, and how to get there.

We all have a point of view and sharing will give us an opportunity to listen and learn from each other. We can't learn without laughter, so of course we will play lots of games. There will be music (bring your instruments!) and yoga and maybe some theater. A movie might get us talking about some issues on one of the evenings. Abby Burford will share some guided meditation with us too (ah, scented eye pillows!)

The group will be facilitated by Stuart Sydenstricker, Jim Mandala, Sylke Jackson, and youth facilitators from the AVP camp that is co-sponsored by Chatham Summit meeting and Wind of the Spirit, an immigrant led non-profit in the area. Fifty eight youth (ages 12-18) have taken Basic/Advanced AVP training and 19 have become Apprentice Facilitators through this camp. Working with a few of these young leaders will provide us with an exciting opportunity to partner with people who are affected by the crackdown on immigration and work together to come up with productive solutions.

Please bring a (Quaker or otherwise) friend! This weekend will be fun and we want to be inclusive and welcoming!

Program will be offered for all ages from nursery to high school. Kids 7th grade and up can participate in the sleep over. Deadline to register is October 30th.
